

Mayor of Lynnwood, Jack Bennett (2). The house is eligible for the federal and state historic registers.



Take a side trip south on 52nd Ave W. On the southwest corner of 194th St. SW. and 52nd Ave. W. is located Wilcox Park (3) and the Scriber Creek bridge (4). Across 196th St. SW. is Scriber Park (5).

3. Wilcox Park (Side Trip)

An early 1920's dairy farmsite owned by Charley Olsen, a local milk deliveryman. (3) The Wilcox family lived on the property, but leased it from another owner. This was the first Lynnwood Park.

4. Scriber Creek Bridge

The bridge in Wilcox Park was constructed in 1931 over Scriber Creek for 196th St. SW. when the street was originally paved. (4)

5. Scriber Lake Park

In 1890, 160 acres was homesteaded at this site by Paul Schreiber. (5) The family later moved to Edmonds where he was one of the first council members. A former resort on Scriber Lake was built by the Barklay family.

Come back to 52nd Ave. W. and continue north up the street to 188th St. SW. Turn right and continue east.

6. Worker House on 188th St. SW.

Near the southwest corner of 48th Ave. W. and 188th St. SW. is located a classic workman's house, constructed in 1920 (6).

Continue east on 188th St. SW. to 40th Ave. W and turn right.

7. Kruger Residence (Side Trip)

A side trip north at 44th Ave. W. for two blocks takes you to a residence near the southwest corner of 44th Ave. W and 186th St. SW. constructed in 1925 (7) The Kruger family sold eggs from their house.

Resume your walk along 188th St. SW.

8. Chase/Echelbarger House

Near the southwest corner of 188th and 40th Ave., is located a residence constructed in 1910. (8) It was owned by a local businessman who operated the freight company.

Turn right on 40th Ave. W. and continue south to 191st Pl. SW. Turn left and walk east until 36th Ave. W.

9. Farrer Building (Side Trip)

A side trip of a block to the north will take you near a commercial building built in 1952 which once housed the Countryside Press (9). The building is eligible for the federal and state historic registers.

Resume your trip south on 36th Ave. W.

10. Valentine/McClane

Near the southwest corner of 36th Ave. W and 191st Pl. SW. is located a residence constructed in 1919. (10) F.C. McClane was superintendent of the Demonstration Farm. The Valentine's were Mrs. McClane's parents who also resided there. The house is eligible for the federal and state historic registers.

11. Manor Hardware

Resume your walk south on 36th Ave W. to the commercial hub of the former Alderwood Manor. At 19500 36th Ave. W. is Manor Hardware (11)



constructed in 1915 by the Puget Mill Company. It was used as a school until a permanent school was constructed two blocks to the south (across from the Convention Center). The building was moved onto a permanent foundation and remodeled with four retail shops. Puget Mill Company occupied the office spaces to the south. The Post Office occupied the north spaces from the 1930's to the 1950's. It is eligible for the state historic register and is listed on the City's register.

12. Masonic Lodge



Across the street, at 19425 36th Ave. W., is the former Masonic Lodge built in 1921 (12). The cornerstone was chiseled in the barn on the homestead of an early Scottish pioneer, William Morrice. The first moving pictures in the area were shown in the auditorium. The building is eligible for the federal and state historic registers.

Return north up 36th Ave. W. and then turn left at 191st Pl. SW. Continue your walk to 40th Ave. W. and turn left to 192nd St. SW.

13. Price/Wiegel House

Near the northwest corner is located a residence constructed in 1922 by John Price and his father. (13) The property was later sold to the Wiegel family. The photograph on the cover of the brochure is this house in the 1920's. The house is eligible for the federal and state historic registers.



Continue south on 40th Ave. W. Turn right and continue west on 192nd St. SW. to 44th Ave. W.

14. Garrison House

Near the southeast corner of 192nd and 44th Ave. W. is a residence (14) constructed in 1925 along with a significant boulder which has served as a resting stop through the years since 44th Ave. W. was a dirt road.

Continue south on 44th Ave. W. to 194th St. SW. Cross the street and return to the start point via Veteran's Park and the Civic campus.

Side Tours

1) Heritage Park

From the Masonic Lodge and Manor Hardware, drive south on 36th Ave. W., turn left (east at 196th St. SW). Cross the freeway and turn right at Poplar Way. Drive south two blocks to Heritage Park to see the restored Humble House, the Wicker's Building, the Interurban Trolley car, and the Alderwood Manor Heritage Cottage and Water Tower.



2) Brookshire Development

After Wilcox Park, follow 52nd Ave W. to 191st. SW. and turn left. Turn right at 65th Ave. W. and follow a loop left along 190th St. SW.

Brookshire Development was constructed in the 1950's and features several classic building designs from that time period.



Follow the loop and continue back along 191st SW to resume your walk on 52nd Ave. W.

3) Pioneer Park

From 188th St. SW, turn north on 36th Ave. W for a loop to Pioneer Park, formerly the Hunter property. This site was the first homestead in Alderwood Manor and was the site of Hunter School.

HISTORIC WALKING TOUR



Start at the Civic Center. Cut through the Park on the east/west trail north of City Hall to 46th Ave. W. Turn left and walk to 192nd St. SW. Turn right.

On the Southeast corner of 52nd Ave W and 192nd St. SW (5130 192nd S. SW) is the home of the first
